- 1. Comparing with the situation in Estonia (national ELL reports), LT primary school teachers and administrators fall behind in initiating quality language projects
- 2. There is not enough information about advantages of initiating projects and ELL campaign.
- 3. Participants are interested on involving subject teachers and building up school communities.

- 1. ELL winners stressed the importance of an original & innovative idea and reliability of partners
- 2. Considering one of the priorities of Erasmus+ (social inclusion), the participants focused on possible future cooperation (training centres, NGOs)
- 3. Skype session with the Romania partners turned into practical steps towards common project application
- 4. Adult education pre-supposes exploring the potential of various sectors and social players



Main result

Three NELLIP partners in cooperation with NELLIP workshop participants initiated and submitted a new project application.

The strategic partnership project WORKPLACE: SOCIETY aims at improving chances of social inclusion for different categories of end-users concerned (ex-convicts, migrants, single mothers unable to support their families, people with disabilities, migrants etc.).

During the project, a transnational network of professionals working on social inclusion will be created, as a base to exchange of good practice and further collaboration.

O.Medvedeva presented two ELL awarded projects Open to Every Citizen (2003) and FEEL (2006) which were initiated the Tertiary sector (Vilnius University and Vytautas Magnus University).



- 1. Although the projects were implemented by university staff, their objectives were oriented to a much broader group of users, the general public.
- 2. Most university and college teachers opt for working in international project teams to create innovative learning materials rather than create something for a less defined group of users.
